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

Senior Administration

President and Vice-Chancellor

The president and vice-chancellor provides institutional leadership and oversight and develops and drives the University's mission and strategies. The president and vicechancellor works for the advancement of the University and acts as its principal voice.

Chancellor

The chancellor is the titular head of the University and confers all degrees. The chancellor is an ex-officio voting member of the Senate and the Board of Governors. The chancellor advances the University's interests within the local, provincial, national and international arenas.

Provost and Vice-President (Academic)

The provost and vice-president (academic) is the chief academic officer of the institution and the principal adviser to the president on all academic affairs. The provost is the highest ranking officer after the president and serves as the acting president in the president's absence.

Vice-President (Research)

The vice-president (research) leads the University's research enterprise. The vice-president (research) champions the University of Guelph's research community externally, and is the lead advocate for regional, provincial, national and international research funding and partnerships.

Vice-President (External)

The vice-president (external) oversees the departments of Alumni Affairs and Development, Communications and Public Affairs, and Government Relations and Community Engagement. Those areas lead the development of public and private philanthropic support for the University and build relationships with key stakeholders to enhance connectivity and engagement.

Vice-President (Finance, Administration and Risk)

The vice-president (finance, administration and risk) oversees a broad range of services for the U of G community, ensuring a safe, healthy and productive environment and upholding fiscal responsibility.

Board of Governors

The Board of Governors oversees the governance, conduct, management and control of the University and its property, revenues, expenditures, business and affairs. The Board is responsible for the appointment of the president, and is vested with all powers necessary or convenient to perform its duties and achieve the objectives and purposes of the University.

Senate

The Senate is responsible for academic programs, regulations and policies and for electing the chancellor.

University Secretariat

The University Secretariat was established in 2006 and incorporates the activities of the former Board and Senate offices. The Secretariat has responsibility for supporting the efficient and timely operation of the Board of Governors, Board of Trustees and the Senate, plus their several committees, subcommittees, task forces and working groups that comprise the bicameral governance system of the University of Guelph.

Ridgetown Campus


In the 1920s, the Ontario government established the Western Ontario Experimental Farm in Ridgetown (located between Windsor and London), which became the Ridgetown College of Agriculture and Technology. In 1997, Ridgetown College became a regional campus of the University of Guelph as part of an agreement between the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) and the University of Guelph now called the Ontario Agri-Food Innovation Alliance. The campus is administered through the University's Ontario Agricultural College.

Each year, more than 600 students take classes at the Ridgetown Campus.

Research is a major focus of the campus, with \$8.4 million in funding awarded in 2018/2019. Most of the research conducted by Ridgetown Campus delivers on Alliance priorities.

Research and Innovation Enterprise

- The University of Guelph's research enterprise supports \$158-million worth of research programs across its colleges, research stations and Ridgetown Campus.
- The University ranks consistently as one of Canada's top comprehensive universities.
- The University of Guelph has a long-standing partnership with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) to produce innovative research and education fundamental to our continued leadership in sustaining and enhancing Canada's agri-food industry. Fifteen research stations, owned by the Agricultural Research Institute of Ontario and administered by OMAFRA, are operated and managed by the University of Guelph through the Ontario Agri-Food Innovation Alliance.
- University of Guelph researchers hold 26 active Canada Research Chairs.





STUDENTS

Almost 30,000 undergraduate and graduate students are enrolled at campuses in Guelph, Ridgetown and Toronto. The University of Guelph attracts about 1,500 international students from more than 120 countries.

U of G focuses on nurturing the "whole student," fostering an environment that supports students' full academic and personal potential by attending to their physical, emotional, psychological and social well-being.

The University aims to help students become critical, creative thinkers who take a multidisciplinary view and who embrace lifelong learning.

U of G prepares students to become the leaders of tomorrow.

Highlights

- In fall 2018, 29,645 students were enrolled at the University of Guelph. Of the 26,741 undergraduate students, 23,730 were full-time and 3,011 part-time. There were 2,685 full-time and 219 part-time graduate students.
- Total enrolment increased 6.1 per cent between 2014 and 2018, from 27,932 to 29,645 students. Undergraduate enrolment increased by 5.2 per cent and graduate enrolment increased by 15.5 per cent.

- International students made up 3.8 per cent of undergraduate students and 16.4 per cent of graduate students. Between 2014 and 2018, international undergraduate student enrolment increased by 37.1 per cent and international graduate student enrolment increased by 29.4 per cent.
- Women made up 60 per cent of the total student population.
- 93.5 per cent of undergraduate students and 75 per cent of graduate students come from Ontario.
- 91 per cent of first-time, full-time, baccalaureate degree-seeking students entering in 2017 continued into their second year of studies at the University of Guelph, which is higher than the provincial average of 90.1 per cent.
- 79.6 per cent of the 2012 first-time, full-time, four-year undergraduate degree-seeking student cohort graduated within six years.
 6,774 degrees were awarded in 2018 (calendar year), an increase of 7.6 per cent over 2014.
 1,078 graduate degrees were awarded in 2018, an increase of 15.9 per cent over 2014.





Total Graduate Headcount Enrolment, as of Nov. 1, 2014/2015 to 2018/2019














Total Graduate Headcount Enrolment Distribution by College, 2018/2019







Graduation Rates: Percentage of First-Time, Full-Time, Four-Year Students Seeking an Undergraduate Degree Who Graduated Within Four Years













RESEARCH

University of Guelph research comfortably spans the continuum between game-changing fundamental discoveries and impactful innovations that solve real-world challenges.

The University of Guelph's research enterprise supports a \$158-million research complement across its colleges, research stations and Ridgetown Campus. University of Guelph research innovations are making meaningful advances that power job creation, economic growth and trade. For example, at the end of the 2018 fiscal year, University of Guelph start-up companies employed 143 people and raised more than \$46 million.

Partnership is a key ingredient to these research and innovation successes. The University of Guelph has unique and deeply embedded relationships with both the public and the private sectors. Such partnerships are integral to generating discoveries and fuelling useful research applications, ensuring we fulfill our ambition to improve life.

Our experience shows that there is immense power in working with others in an environment that promotes excellence, equity, diversity and inclusivity.

We're proud of our research and innovation accomplishments and applaud faculty, staff, students and our many partners, all united in our mission to improve life.

Highlights

- Researcher part of international team awarded \$25M. Prof. Emma Allen-Vercoe and her international research team were awarded \$25 million from Cancer Research UK to advance their study of connections between microbes in the body and cancer.
- Provincial funding for new research facilities. A new swine research facility will be built at the University of Guelph's Elora research station, as well as a new agronomy facility at the New Liskeard research station. The funding underscores provincial support for continuous improvement in the University of Guelph's animal care and research infrastructure.
- U of G gets \$2.5M for research in social sciences, humanities. The federal government is granting more than \$2.5 million to the University of Guelph for humanities and social sciences research. The funds will allow researchers to examine topics ranging from climate change to government accounting practices. At the University of Guelph, 13 projects were supported through Insight Development Grants, which support early-stage research.

The University also received support for 37 graduate scholarships and fellowships.

- Federal government invests in genomics. Healthier consumers, animals and ecosystems are the focus of three University of Guelph genomics research projects that received federal funding worth \$1.5 million. Prof. Bonnie Mallard, Department of Pathobiology, will adapt high immune response technology developed for dairy cattle to improve beef cattle's health and welfare. Integrative biology professor Mehrdad Hajibabaei is working to validate environmental DNA meta-barcoding for use in monitoring the health of the country's watersheds and rivers. To better process huge volumes of DNA sequence data, a team led by integrative biology professors Sarah Adamowicz and Paul Hebert will include experts in computing, informatics and statistics.
- University of Guelph-led network received \$2M to link cultural researchers. The Linked Infrastructure for Networked Cultural Scholarship project, led by Prof. Susan Brown, will convert large datasets into an organized, interconnected, machineprocessable set of resources for Canadian cultural research. The project recently received funding from the Canada Foundation for Innovation Cyber-infrastructure competition.
 - Research team receives international award to develop plant-based steak. The project led by Prof. Mario Martinez, School of Engineering, was one of eight international plant-based meat initiatives chosen to receive funding to create plant-based alternatives to meat, recreating the textures of beef, chicken and fish. Funding was received from the Good Food Institute, a non-profit organization based in Washington, D.C. University of Guelph researchers hope to create a plant



steak that's indistinguishable from the animal version.

- Exploring new frontiers in research. The New Frontiers in Research fund supported the development of a novel approach by Prof. Georgina Cox, Department of Molecular and Cellular Biology, to control often-deadly bacterial infections. Prof. Dennis Muecher, Department of Physics, received \$236,812 to help hone proton therapy, an emerging cancer treatment.
 - **Bioeconomy research receives awards.** A University of Guelph research project led by Prof. Amar Mohanty, director of the Bioproducts Discovery and Development Centre (BDDC), to turn co-products from ethanol production into new products has been awarded \$1 million from Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC) and three industry partners. The five-year project, called the Bioproducts Agri-Science Cluster, will receive \$700,000 from AAFC's AgriScience Program and \$300,000 from IGPC Ethanol, Competitive Green Technologies and Greenfield Global. Mohanty and Prof. Manjusri Misra of the

BDDC received the Synergy Award for Innovation from the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council. This award recognizes dynamic partnerships between universities and Canadian industry in natural sciences and engineering research and development. The announcement was made in Ottawa during a special event at the Governor General of Canada's residence in Ottawa.

- Food from Thought announces funding for innovative research. Food from Thought announced its largest funding distribution to date, supporting the continuation of innovative research programs and the launch of new projects. Nearly \$20 million was allocated to 35 of the University of Guelph's top researchers to continue research that leverages leading agriculture and biodiversity science, big data, digital tools and technologies, economics and social sciences. This second round of funding supports ongoing projects with a long-term focus; expands the number of excellent researchers involved in Food from Thought; and launches new projects that will forge fresh paths in integrated digital agri-food. Funding will come from the Canada First Research Excellence Fund, which supports world-leading research at universities and colleges.
- Professor recognized by Library and Archives Canada. Prof. Lawrence Hill, School of English and Theatre Studies, is one of five Canadians to receive an inaugural Library and Archives Canada (LAC) Scholars Award. The LAC Scholars Awards are a new prize created to recognize the outstanding contribution of individuals who have dedicated their lives to the creation and promotion of the country's literary and historical heritage.
- Innovation at Guelph gets funding. The University of Guelph celebrated \$66.6-million worth of research and innovation enhancements during a campus visit by

Navdeep Bains, federal minister of innovation, science and economic development. Bains was on campus to mark the completion or opening of six major University of Guelph projects that received more than \$26 million in 2016 from the federal government's Post-Secondary Institutions Strategic Investment Fund. The projects include exploring new innovations that will replace plastics with bio-based materials, upgrading chemistry teaching labs, and creating new study and meeting spaces in the McLaughlin Library.

- New Marketing Analytics Centre. The University of Guelph's Gordon S. Lang School of Business and Economics is launching the Marketing Analytics Centre, a research centre focused entirely on marketing analytics and consumer-driven big data. It will serve as a think tank for industry and academics. Directed by marketing and consumer studies professor Tanya Mark, it is the first research centre in Canada to use business analytics to explore consumer behaviour in the food and health industries. Mark said translating large amounts of data into tangible business plans is crucial for marketers.
- U of G Launches Ethical Artificial Intelligence Centre. Building "machines with morals" and addressing the ethics of artificial intelligence are among the goals of a new research and teaching centre announced at the University of Guelph. Prof. Graham Taylor, School of Engineering, will be the academic director of the new Centre for Advancing Responsible and Ethical Artificial Intelligence (CARE-AI). Among only a handful of Canadian groups of its kind, the new centre will ensure that AI technologies - now being rapidly deployed in numerous fields from health care to feeding the world - benefit people and minimize harm. It also aims to influence public policy and regulations. The centre will focus on applying machine learning and AI to University

of Guelph strengths, including human and animal health, environmental sciences, and agri-food and the bio-economy.

- University of Guelph receives high ranking • among research universities. Out of 13 comprehensive universities - those with a full range of graduate programs and professional schools but not including a medical school - the University of Guelph placed second. This marks the fourth consecutive year the University has placed second among the comprehensive universities in the ranking. The rankings are based on several measurements, including total sponsored research income, the number of publications in leading journals and research impact. The University of Guelph has long-standing international research prowess in animal sciences and agricultural sciences, and growing international research recognition in human health, creative arts and social sciences.
- Finding a solution to smog. The world's • vehicles emit millions of tonnes of pollutants each year that are linked to health problems. Research from the lab of Prof. Bill van Heyst, School of Engineering, is contributing to a solution. His team, together with Guelph company EnvisionSQ, has developed a roadside smog barrier coated with a photocatalyst that reduces pollutants, such as nitrogen oxide, by up to 50 per cent. The innovative technology has widespread application for use from automotive factories to cannabis producers - and even ridding homes of allergy-inducing or healththreatening airborne chemicals.

- Start-up company MicroSintesis partners with U of G to commercialize proteobiotics. Professor emeritus Mansel Griffiths, Department of Food Science, received the 2018 Research Innovation Office Innovation of the Year award for pioneering the use of probiotic extracts to reduce the spread of harmful bacteria, enhancing the health and welfare of livestock and companion animals today, and ultimately translating these benefits to humans in the future.
- New Institute to focus on One Health. From heading off the next global pandemic to improving food security in Canada's North, tackling some of humanity's most pressing health problems is the purpose of a new research and teaching institute being launched at the University of Guelph. The new One Health Institute will bring together multidisciplinary researchers from across campus along with external partners to address the connections among the health of humans, animals and the environment. New programming is under way in the Ontario Veterinary College, the College of Biological Science and the College of Social and Applied Human Sciences.
- Community-engaged research led by University of Guelph professor. The University of Guelph has a deep history and prominent expertise in community-engaged research. Sociology professor Sharada Srinivasan collaborates with local and global populations, using scholarly approaches and evidence to address the challenges and opportunities they identify. Srinivasan leads a four-country research team studying impediments to young farmers.





Tri-Agency Funding (\$ 000's), 2014/2015 versus 2018/2019








Sponsored Research Income, 2004/2005 to 2018/2019 (\$ 000's)

SCHOLARSHIPS AND FINANCIAL AID

Through Student Financial Services, the University of Guelph offers a range of scholarships and financial aid programs to support students in their program of study.

The University's top entrance awards for undergraduate students are the President's and Chancellors' scholarships. The Brock Doctoral Scholarship, named for William and Anne Brock and provided to a doctoral candidate, is one of the University of Guelph's most prestigious awards.

University of Guelph students may receive financial aid through several programs, as follows:

- Work study: part-time job program to help students meet their education costs
- Undergraduate research assistantship (URA): summer research opportunities that enable students to work with faculty members and increase their knowledge and understanding of their field of study
- Undergraduate student research award (USRA): intended to nurture interest and develop potential for research careers in the natural sciences and engineering
- Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP): loans funded by the provincial and federal governments to help eligible students meet post-secondary education costs

Highlights

- Total financial aid available to students in 2018-19 (University of Guelph, Guelph-Humber and Ridgetown) was \$53.4 million, an increase of 34.7 per cent since 2014-15.
- Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) funding totalled \$174 million in 2018-19, consisting of \$86 million in loans and \$88 million in grants.

ATHLETICS

Health and wellness of campus members is the focus of state-of-the-art athletics and fitness facilities, including the award-winning Guelph Gryphons Athletics Centre (GGAC) opened in 2017.

The 170,000-square-foot facility includes a 22,000-square-foot fitness centre and a 2,200-seat events centre for major gatherings.

Along with the adjoining Student Wellness centre, the GGAC offers a complete hub for health and wellness on campus.

Promoting equity and excellence in women's sports is the focus of the She's Got Game campaign to raise \$2.5 million, intended to support scholarships and funding, awareness and engagement and policy change to support our women athletes.

Numerous athletics facilities on campus include Alumni Stadium, the Fieldhouse, the Gryphon Centre Arena and the Soccer Complex.

Highlights

 The GGAC features a 200m three-lane walking track; 8,000 square feet of social space including a student lounge and VIP suite; 2,200-seat event centre; three spacious change rooms/locker facilities, including steam rooms; 22,000-square-footfitness centre; six multi-purpose rooms; and a 40-foot-rock climbing wall.

- The GGAC is open about 6,300 hours per year for students to enjoy a variety of recreational activities. Drop-in rec activities throughout all facilities include badminton, baseball, basketball, beach volleyball, heavy bag boxing, disk golf, hockey, hot tub and swimming, skating, soccer, squash, pickleball, table tennis, Ultimate Frisbee and volleyball.
- More than 97 group fitness classes are offered each week.
- 23 athletic clubs
- 19 intramural sports, five days a week, with a variety of divisions
- New outdoor recreation and leadership program
- All University of Guelph students get free admission to all in-season varsity home games with their student cards.





PHYSICAL RESOURCES

The University of Guelph operates campuses in Guelph, Toronto and Ridgetown.

The University of Guelph operates a network of research stations in Ontario conducting innovative studies in plant and animal sciences, environmental sciences, engineering and veterinary sciences.

The Guelph campus blends historical and modern architecture and cuttingedge learning and research technology. Its 400-acre arboretum features plant collections, gardens and natural areas.

The main campus is home to world-leading research and scholarship facilities, including:

- Gordon S. Lang School of Business and Economics
- Centre for Biodiversity Genomics
- Bioproducts Discovery and Development Centre
- Canadian Femicide Observatory

- One Health Institute
- International Institute for Sports Business and Leadership

Highlights

Projects completed/in-progress in 2018-19 included:

- Production Animal Research Isolation Unit - Work was completed on the facility with a new Biosafety Level 2 production animal research isolation unit that will allow for continued and enhanced research and training programs to identify and prevent infectious diseases.
- J.T. Powell Renovation and Addition

 Work was completed on the project to create a central, consolidated student wellness hub for the campus.
- Heat Recovery Loop Expansion Work was completed on the project funded by the provincial Greenhouse Gas Campus Retrofits Program for the expansion of the campus heat recovery system and addition of an electric boiler.
- **OVC Phase 1 and 2** Work has progressed on the renovation of the veterinary hospital as well as the Enhanced Learning addition.

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- **Relocation of Turfgrass Institute** Work has progressed on the relocation from the Victoria Street location to the Arboretum.
- Former VMI Building Work has progressed on the adaptation and renewal project that will create a new home for the Couple and Family Therapy Centre and Psychological Clinical Services units.
- MacKinnon Building North Wing/ Community Improv Theatre - Work has progressed on the renovation and addition that will upgrade and make accessible the north wing of the MacKinnon Building as well as construct an accessible, multi-use Improv Lab theatre.

Projects commenced in 2018-19 included:



 Phase III A project to renew the exterior of the building includes recladding the exterior walls, replacing the windows and renovating the roof.
- Lang Plaza Redevelopment, Macdonald Hall - A project to redevelop the plaza area in front of the Macdonald Hall building includes new landscaping, hardscape renewal and infrastructure repairs to the tunnel below grade and repairs to Macdonald Hall façade.



Buildings Construction Date








FINANCIAL SERVICES

The University of Guelph's commitment to improve life through research, teaching and community-building has a total impact of \$7.2 billion on the Canadian economy.

Locally, \$1.6 billion of the University's cumulative contribution is injected into the regional economy each year, including \$789 million in direct expenditures, and supports more than 12,000 full-time jobs.

Students alone contribute \$370 million each year in living expenses, which sustains more than 5,000 local jobs.

Highlights

- University financial results remained positive overall for the 2019 fiscal year, although the results decreased compared to 2018. Revenues from increased investment returns, tuition, contracts and grants contributed to a 4.9 per cent increase in total revenue.
- Total expenses increased 6.4 per cent primarily due to salaries, benefits and other expenses in trust.
- The invested in capital assets component of net assets includes \$89 million invested in fiscal 2019 in buildings, equipment and facilities funded by government grants, contributions, operating reserves and internal financing.
- The unrestricted deficit consists almost entirely of the University's unfunded liability for employee future benefits, which includes obligations for both pension and non-pension benefits. In fiscal 2019, this deficit decreased because of an actual return of 6.5 per cent on invested pension plan assets, higher than the expected return (discount rate) of 5.65 per cent.



ALUMNI AFFAIRS AND DEVELOPMENT

University of Guelph alumni are engaged and give generously of their time and resources to support the University and its shared purpose to Improve Life.

The University of Guelph has 179,000 alumni from more than 160 countries worldwide. That international reach mirrors the University's global presence in teaching, research and international development projects around the globe under the Global@Guelph initiative. Recent and ongoing projects supported by Gryphon alumni include:

- Alumni Stadium Pavilion and landscaping project
- Macdonald Hall renovations
- Studies of sustainable food engineering and Lyme disease
- Natural Health Products Research Alliance
- Student scholarships/travel grants and new faculty positions

Highlights

- 2018-19 was the most successful fundraising year in the University of Guelph's history with support totalling \$59,747,733.
- Donors supported a variety of projects, research and scholarships across campus, including the Honey Bee Research Centre, the Guelph Family Health Study, Student Health and Wellness programs, a new food laboratory in the School of Hospitality, Food and Tourism Management, Equine Guelph research, the T.K. Warley Agrifood Policy Prize, Dr. Bruce Groves Athletics and OVC Graduate Research Scholarships, and the Georgian Partners Scholarship in Cybersecurity and Threat Intelligence.
- In April 2019, a game-changing \$21-million donation from Stu and Kim Lang was announced for business and economics research and education. Earlier in the year, the University received a groundbreaking \$7-million gift from John F. Wood. In recognition, the College of Business and Economics was renamed the Gordon S. Lang School of Business and Economics, and the John F. Wood Centre for Business and Student Enterprise was created. In total, these two gifts alone will support six new academic chairs, nine undergraduate scholarships,

nine graduate scholarships and one coop scholarship, and will create new funds to support facility enhancement, teaching development and experiential learning.

- 2,379 students received a donor-supported award.
- New confirmations of planned gifts bring the projected value of confirmed planned gift expectancies to more than \$80 million. Last year, 36 benefactors made 41 gifts to the University of Guelph and its campuses through will bequests, insurance gifts and trust agreements.
- In 2018-19, 2,831 donors gave to the University of Guelph for the first time.
- More than 50 per cent of donors who gave last year have given consistently for between two and five years in a row (6,422).

- 1,062 University of Guelph donors are young alumni who graduated after 2009 and are 35 years old or younger.
- 11,760 donors made gifts under \$25,000, totaling \$4,863,269.
- 85 donors made gifts between \$25,000 and \$499,999 (total \$8,140,712).
- 7 donors made gifts between \$500,000 and \$999,999 (total \$6,085,698).
- 8 donors made gifts of \$1million or more (total \$40,658,053).
- In 2018-19, University of Guelph students received a total of \$53.4 million in awards and financial aid (including donor-funded awards).





COMPUTING AND COMMUNICATIONS SERVICES

The Department of Computing and Communications Services (CCS) at the University of Guelph provides central information technology (IT) services to the campus community. CCS partners with units across campus to support teaching, learning and research through core IT services, as follows:


- The CCS IT Help Centre provides free IT help to students, staff, and faculty via phone and email, as well as in-person at the library IT Help Desk.
- As one of the largest employers of co-op students on campus, CCS provides many

experiential learning opportunities for students in IT-related and other disciplines.

- CCS employs 108 regular full-time staff members, and posts regularly for new positions.
- The University of Guelph receives about 1 billion emails/year, with 96 per cent (967 million) being blocked by our Information Security team.
- CCS is improving collaboration on campus with the recent launch of tools like Microsoft Teams (2,500 users) and Cisco WebEx (450 users); its digital sign program was nominated for a 2019 Apex Award.
- This year, significant WiFi improvements were completed in 61 buildings on campus.
- The new CCS next-generation data centre houses 16 servers, 32 CPUs, 448 cores and more than 7 TB of memory.
- CCS is helping to foster a culture of inclusion on campus with the launch of the Digital Accessibility Resource Centre, helping to ensure University of Guelph digital content is accessible to all. CCS partnered with Campus Police to help launch U of G Alert – the campus emergency notification system – which now has 32,000 registered users.

MCLAUGHLIN LIBRARY

Libraries exist to help make the world a better place by advancing knowledge. They inspire people to build on existing knowledge and to seek out new ways of thinking. The McLaughlin Library opened more than 50 years ago (October 1968). Today its books and journals are juxtaposed with new digital resources, which publish research much faster. During the transition to new forms of scholarship, library staff provide expertise to faculty and students to ensure that digital knowledge is created, disseminated and preserved for future knowledge seekers.


- The University of Guelph's Archival and Special Collections holds the largest collection of Scottish materials outside the U.K. In February 2019, the new Scottish Studies Foundation Digitization Room opened. Digitizing primary resources allows for this information to be openly accessed free online from around the world.
- The Ontario Agricultural College Review digitization project was completed (after 10 years)
- The library mobilizes University of Guelph knowledge via the Atrium, the University's institutional repository, which was established in 2011. Use of these datasets:
 - 4,000 number of theses in the Atrium
 - 1,129,994 number of accesses during the 2018-2019 academic year
 - 2,363,868 total number of downloads since 2011

Student Academic Support

- During the 2018-2019 academic year, the library saw an increase in demand for English as an additional language (EAL) Learning Commons services.
 - 300-per-cent increase in student participation
 - 30 per cent of Learning Commons users are EAL students
 - 93 per cent of graduate student participants in the spring 2018 session of the EAL Graduate Writing Camp reported that attending the camp was a valuable use of their time; 92 per cent reported that their confidence in using writing and editing strategies had improved.
- The library increased its seating capacity by 10 per cent—up to 3,571 seats.

 The library supports faculty interested in exploring open textbooks/resources in a range of disciplines, including microbiology, human kinetics, management, psychology, population medicine and environmental sciences.

Open Learning and Educational Support (OpenEd) is an integral part of the University of Guelph's learnercentred and research-intensive mission.

OpenEd creates innovative and relevant educational opportunities that meet the learning needs of local and international students. Guided by learner-centred principles, OpenEd intentionally integrates pedagogy with technology in the design, development and delivery of diverse educational programs and rich learning experiences for traditional and lifelong learners. Through research and collaboration, OpenEd engages in scholarship to advance the teaching and learning mandate of the University.

- In 2018-19, OpenEd had 35,008 online degree-credit enrolments, an increase of 30 per cent over 2013-14 (26,921)

Fact Book Glossary

CAUBO – Canadian Association of University Business Officers

CIHR - Canadian Institutes of Health Research

COFO – Council of Ontario Finance Officers

Credits – Guelph courses are based on credit weight. Most courses are valued at 0.5, and some have credit weighting of 0.25, 0.75 or 1.00. A full-time course load for students at Guelph is 2.00 (typically four courses) or 2.50 (typically five courses) per semester. 2.75 credits is the maximum course load a University of Guelph student can take per semester. Credit weight is based on the amount of work involved in the course, not the number of hours.

CSRDE – Consortium for Student Retention Data Exchange

Degrees Awarded – Refers to total degrees conferred at annual convocations

FCI – Facility Condition Index

FTE (Full-time Equivalent) – Full-time graduate headcount enrolment plus a full-time equivalent of part-time graduate headcount enrolment (0.3 times part-time headcount)

FFTE (Fiscal Full-time Equivalent) – For most undergraduate programs, FFTE is based on the student credit load as a proportion of the normal annual credit load for that program. The normal load is determined by the total required credits specified in the University calendar. For the DVM program, a full-time student generates 0.5 FFTEs in each active term.

Full-time Student – The normal full-time semester load for academic programs is 2.50 credits except where otherwise prescribed by the schedule of studies. **Headcount** – Number of students enrolled at the University

International – Students studying at the University on a study permit

MTCU – Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities

NASM – Net Assignable Square Metres

OMAFRA – Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs

Other Canadian SS – Other Canadian Secondary Schools
