

RESEARCH STATIONS

Senior Administration

President and Vice-Chancellor

The President and Vice-Chancellor provides institutional leadership and oversight and develops and drives the University's mission and strategies. The President and Vice-Chancellor works for the advancement of the University and acts as the principal voice of the University.

Chancellor

The Chancellor is the titular head of the University and confers all degrees. The Chancellor is an ex-officio voting member of the Senate and the Board of Governors. The Chancellor advances the University's interests within the local, provincial, national and international arenas.

Provost and Vice-President (Academic)

The provost and vice-president (academic) is the chief academic officer of the institution and the principal adviser to the president on all academic affairs. The provost is the highest-ranking officer after the president and serves as the acting president in the president's absence.

Vice-President (Research)

The vice-president (research) provides leadership for the development and implementation of the University of Guelph's research endeavours, strategic planning and policy framework. The vice-president (research) oversees operational units within the Office of the Vice-President (Research) including Research Services, Agri-Food Partnership, Research Innovation Office, Research Communications, and Food From Thought.

Vice-President (External)

The vice-president (external) oversees the departments of Alumni Affairs and Development and Communications and Public Affairs, as well

as government and community relations. Those areas lead the development of public and private philanthropic support for the University and build relationships with key stakeholders to enhance connectivity and engagement.

Vice-President (Finance, Administration and Risk)

The vice-president (finance, administration and risk) oversees a broad range of services, notably providing quality specialized services to the University community; ensuring a safe, healthy and productive environment; and ensuring fiscal responsibility.

Board of Governors

The Board of Governors oversees the governance, conduct, management and control of the University and its property, revenues, expenditures, business and affairs. The Board is responsible for the appointment of the president, and is vested with all powers necessary or convenient to perform its duties and achieve the objectives and purposes of the University.

Senate

The Senate is responsible for academic programs, regulations and policies and for electing the Chancellor.

University Secretariat

The University Secretariat was established in 2006 and incorporates the activities of the former Board Office and Senate Office. The Secretariat has responsibility for supporting the efficient and timely operation of the Board of Governors, Board of Trustees and the Senate plus their several committees, subcommittees, task forces and working groups which comprise the bicameral governance system of the University of Guelph.

University of Guelph-Humber

In 2002, U of G partnered with Humber College to create the University of Guelph-Humber. The institution provides students with a unique blend of theoretical and applied learning.

The campus is located in North Toronto at the Humber College campus.

Ridgetown Campus

In the 1920s, the Ontario government established the Western Ontario Experimental Farm in Ridgetown (located between Windsor and London), which eventually became the Ridgetown College of Agriculture and Technology. In 1997, Ridgetown College became a regional campus of the University of Guelph as part of the OMAFRA-U of G Agreement. The campus is administered through the University's Ontario Agricultural College.

Over the course of a year, over 600 students take classes at the Ridgetown Campus.

Research is a major focus of the campus, with \$7.5 million in annual funding awarded. Most of the research conducted by Ridgetown Campus delivers on OMAFRA-U of G Agreement priorities.

Research Enterprise

- U of G's research enterprise supports \$147-million worth of research programs across U of G's colleges, research stations and Ridgetown Campus.
- The University ranks consistently as one of Canada's top comprehensive universities.
- U of G has a long-standing partnership with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs (OMAFRA) to produce innovative research and education fundamental to our continued leadership in sustaining and enhancing Canada's agri-food industry. The provincial government recently committed \$713 million toward renewing the unique agreement between the University of Guelph and the OMAFRA to further discovery and innovation and position Canada as a world leader in agri-food. 15 research stations, owned by the Agricultural Research Institute of Ontario and administered by OMAFRA, are operated and managed by the University of Guelph through the OMAFRA-U of G Agreement.
- The University of Guelph recently received \$76.6 million from the federal government to support its Food from Thought project that will use high-tech information systems to help produce enough food for a growing human population while sustaining the Earth's ecosystems.
- U of G researchers hold 27 active Canada Research Chairs.



STUDENTS



Almost 30,000 undergraduate and graduate students are enrolled at campuses in Guelph, Ridgetown and Toronto. The University of Guelph attracts about 1,400 international students from nearly 130 countries.

U of G focuses on nurturing the "whole student," fostering an environment that supports students' full academic and personal potential by attending to their physical, emotional, psychological and social well-being.

The University aims to help students become critical, creative thinkers who take a multidisciplinary view and who embrace lifelong learning.

U of G prepares students to become the leaders of tomorrow.

Highlights

- As of Nov. 1, 2017, a total of 29,507 students were enrolled at the University of Guelph. There were 26,677 undergraduate students, made up of 23,808 full-time and 2,869 parttime students. Graduate students were enrolled as 2,620 full-time students and 210 part-time students.
- Total enrolment increased 6.3% from 2013-2017, from 27,747 to 29,507 students. Undergraduate enrolment increased by 5.9% and graduate enrolment increased by 10.5%.

- International students made up 3.6% of undergraduate students and 15.4% of graduate students. Undergraduate student international enrolment increased by 58.6% between 2013 and 2017, while graduate student international enrolment increased by 27.8% during the same five year period.
- Female students made up the majority of the student population at 58% of total students.
- The majority of students come from within Ontario: 94% of undergraduate students and 75% of grad students.
- 90.9% of first-time, full-time, baccalaureate degree-seeking students entering in 2016 continued into their second year of studies at the University of Guelph.
- 78.7% of the 2011 first-time, full-time, four year undergraduate degree-seeking student cohort graduated within 6 years. 6,494 degrees were awarded in 2017 (calendar year), an increase of 6.6% over 2013. 167 doctoral degrees were awarded in 2017, an increase of 6.4% over 2013.















Total Undergraduate Headcount Enrolment Demographics, 2017/2018





Total Graduate Enrolment and Demographic Information, 2017/2018




Total Graduate Headcount Enrolment Distribution by College, 2017/2018



Retention Rates of First-Time, Full-Time, Four-Year Students Seeking an Undergraduate Degree





Graduation Rates: Percentage of First-Time, Full-Time, Four-Year Students Seeking an Undergraduate Degree Who Graduated Within Four Years










Full-time Faculty by Appointment Status, 2017









Highlights

- For the 2017/2018 academic year, an entering domestic undergraduate student's tuition fees range from \$6,571 to \$12,175, depending on their area of study. For an entering international student, tuition fees range from \$20,840 to \$61,330.
- In 2017/2018, an entering domestic full-time graduate master's student's tuition ranges from \$7,847 to \$8,041. The fees listed for MBA and MA Leadership are full-program fees. New international full-time graduate master's students' tuition ranges from \$18,733 to \$20,110. The fees listed for MBA and MA Leadership are full-program fees.
- Entering domestic student tuition fees for diplomas in 2017/2018 ranged from \$2,376 to \$6,571, and international full-time diploma student tuition ranged from \$7,985 to \$22,632.

RESEARCH



The University of Guelph ranks among Canada's top research-intensive and innovative universities. Nearly \$150 million is awarded each year to U of G researchers and scholars from various public and private sources, including all major Canadian research funding agencies and councils.

U of G consistently receives top ranking in Canada and abroad for agri-food and veterinary research.

Known as Canada's food university, the institution stands at the hub of a world-class agri-food research and innovation cluster. Since 1997, U of G's unique partnership with the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs has supported studies from farm to table and helped improve food and farming, health and the environment.

Highlights

The University of Guelph has received its single largest-ever gift: a \$20-million donation from the Arrell Family Foundation. The donation has created the Arrell Food Institute at U of G. The University is providing matching funds of \$20 million, for a total commitment of \$40 million. Along with recent government and private funding — including a \$77-million award from the Canada First Research Excellence Fund for the Food from Thought project — this new gift brings the total investment in agri-food at U of G to more than \$150 million in a 12-month period.

- The inaugural Arrell Global Food Innovation Awards recognize individuals or groups who have made significant contributions toward a more sustainable, safe, equitable and nutritious global food system.
- Three faculty members were announced as Arrell Food Chairs, and five graduate students were among the inaugural group to receive Arrell Food Institute scholarships.
- The University of Guelph has created

Canada's first academic chair in sustainable food engineering, backed by a \$5-million gift from the Barrett Family Foundation. The chair is intended to develop innovative ways to improve food processing and production.

- A University of Guelph professor known as a pioneer in digital humanities scholarship has received \$456,000 from the federal government to expand and enhance the Canadian Writing Research Collaboratory.
- The Canada Foundation for Innovation invested \$3.4 million to support innovative projects in the Department of Economics and Finance, the Department of History and the School of English and Theatre Studies. The funding supports a laboratory for improvisational performance and an integrated database that gives researchers access to the historical records of 32 million Canadians.
- The University was awarded \$3.4 million for two new Canada Research Chairs and renewal of three others.
- A number of University of Guelph faculty members were recognized. One faculty member was named as a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada (RSC) and three faculty members were selected by the College of New Scholars, Artists and Scientists.
- Six University of Guelph faculty members will receive provincial Early Researcher Awards in 2018, which doubles the number of awards since 2017.





Sponsored Research Income, 2004/2005 to 2017/2018 (\$ 000's)



SCHOLARSHIPS AND FINANCIAL AID



Through Student Financial Services, the University of Guelph offers a range of scholarships and financial aid programs to support students in their program of study.

The University's top entrance awards for undergraduate students are the President's and Chancellor's scholarships. The Brock Doctoral Scholarship, named for William and Anne Brock and provided to a doctoral candidate, is one of U of G's most prestigious awards.

U of G students may receive financial aid through several programs, as follows:

- Work study: part-time job program to help students meet their education costs.
- Undergraduate research assistantship (URA): summer research opportunities that enable students to work with faculty members and increase their knowledge and understanding of their field of study.
- Undergraduate student research award (USRA): intended to nurture interest and develop potential for research careers in the natural sciences and engineering.
- Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP): loans funded by the provincial and federal governments to help eligible students meet post-secondary education costs.

Highlights

- Total financial aid available to students in 2017/2018 (University of Guelph, Guelph-Humber and Ridgetown) was \$51.4 million, an increase of 33.6% since 2013/2014.
- Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) funding totaled \$157 million in 2017/2018, consisting of \$78 million in loans and \$79 million in grants.

ATHLETICS



Health and wellness of campus members is the focus of state-of-the-art athletics and fitness facilities, including the award-winning Guelph Gryphons Athletics Centre (GGAC), opened in 2017.

The 170,000-square-foot facility includes a 22,000-square-foot fitness centre and a 2,200-seat events centre for major gatherings, including U of G convocation ceremonies.

Along with the adjoining Student Wellness Education Centre, the GGAC will offer a complete hub for health and wellness on campus.

Promoting equity and excellence in women's sports is the focus of the She's Got Game campaign to raise \$2.5 million, intended to support scholarships and funding, awareness and engagement and policy change to support our female athletes.

Numerous athletics facilities on campus include Alumni Stadium, the Fieldhouse, the Gryphon Centre Arena and the Soccer Complex.

Highlights

 The Guelph Gryphons Athletics Centre features a 200m, three-lane walking track; 8,000 square feet of social space including a student lounge and VIP Suite; 2,200seat event centre; three spacious changeroom/ locker facilities, including steam rooms; 22,000-square-foot fitness centre; six multipurpose rooms; 40-foot rock climbing wall.

- The Guelph Gryphons Athletics Centre is open about 6,300 hours per year for students to enjoy a variety of recreational activities. Dropin rec activities throughout all facilities include: badminton; baseball; basketball; beach volleyball; heavy bag boxing; disk golf; hockey; hot tub and swimming; skating; soccer; squash; pickleball; table tennis; ultimate frisbee; and volleyball.
- State-of-the-art fitness centre is open about 6,000 hours per year.
- More than 97 group fitness classes offered each week.
- 23 athletic clubs.
- 19 intramural sports, five days a week, with a variety of divisions.
- New outdoor recreation and leadership program.
- All U of G students get into all in-season varsity home games for FREE with their student cards.







PHYSICAL RESOURCES



The University of Guelph operates campuses in Guelph, Toronto and Ridgetown.

U of G also operates a network of research stations in Ontario conducting innovative studies in plant and animal sciences, environmental sciences, engineering and veterinary sciences.

The Guelph campus blends historical and modern architecture and cuttingedge learning and research technology. Its 400-acre arboretum features plant collections, gardens and natural areas.

The main campus is home to world-leading research and scholarship facilities, including:

- Ontario Veterinary College, including the Mona Campbell Centre for Animal Cancer.
- Centre for Biodiversity Genomics.
- Bioproducts Discovery and Development Centre.
- Canadian Femicide Observatory for Justice and Accountability.
- International Institute for Critical Studies in Improvisation.

Highlights

Federal \$66M Strategic Investment Fund projects in 2017/18 included:

- Renewal and Renovation of the MacNaughton Building – Work was completed on the \$14M project to support research and innovation within the Chemistry department.
- Research Collaboratory: McLaughlin Library Renewal and Renovation – Work was completed on the \$16M project that created a Research Collaboratory space supporting the next generation of leadingedge research producing new methodologies, unique digital content, data sets and tools that benefit disciplines across the University.
- Bioproducts Discovery and Development Centre: Bio-carbon Research Centre

 Work was completed on the \$7M addition with an expansion of the existing facility to support the research and innovation in bioproducts.
- Guelph Food Innovation Centre Work was completed on the \$5M project which repurposed and upgraded existing facilities and will accelerate research and innovation, increase partnerships

with industry and expand training across the food manufacturing sector.

- Reynolds Building Research and Collaborative Space – Work was completed on the \$9M project with the renovation and renewal of the 100 century-old old Reynolds Building. The major building systems have passed their useful life expectancy and have been renewed.
- Production Animal Research
 Isolation Unit Work has progressed on
 the \$15M facility with a new Biosafety Level
 2 production animal research isolation unit
 that will allow for continued and enhanced
 research and training programs to identify
 and prevent infectious diseases.

Other projects in 2017/18 included:

- McLaughlin Library: Renovation and Renewal of Lower Level – Work was completed on the \$5M project which created compact solutions for archives and collections and freed up much-needed space for student study and collaboration.
- OVC Phase 1 & 2 Work has progressed on the \$15M renovation of the veterinary hospital as well as the \$20M "Enhanced Learning" addition.

- J.T. Powell Renovation and Addition Work has progressed on the \$12M project to create a central consolidated student wellness hub for the campus.
- **Relocation of Turfgrass Institute** Work has progressed on the \$15M relocation from the Victoria Street location to the Arboretum.

Projects commenced in 2017/18 included:

- Former VMI Building a \$12M adaption and renewal project that will create a new home for the Couple and Family Therapy Centre and Psychological Clinical Services units.
- MacKinnon Building North Wing/ Improv Theatre – a \$20M renovation and addition that will upgrade and make accessible the north wing of the MacKinnon Building as well as construct an accessible multi-use ImprovLab theatre.
- Heat Recovery Loop Expansion a \$9M project funded by the provincial Greenhouse Gas Campus Retrofits Program will incorporate the expansion of the campus heat recovery system and include the addition of an electric boiler.



Buildings Construction Date









Gross Area by Year Built

FINANCIAL SERVICES



The University of Guelph's commitment to improve life through research, teaching and community-building has a total impact of \$7.2 billion on the Canadian economy.

Locally, \$1.6 billion of the University's cumulative contribution is injected into the regional economy each year, including \$789 in direct expenditures, and supports more than 12,000 full-time jobs.

Students alone contribute \$370 million each year in living expenses, which sustains more than 5,000 local jobs.

Highlights

- University financial results for the 2018 fiscal year were positive overall, although not to the extent seen in 2017. Revenues associated with continued growth in student enrolments offset by lower investment returns contributed to the 0.9% increase in **Total Revenue.**
- **Total Expenses** increased 4.8% primarily due to salaries, benefits and student assistance.
- The Invested in Capital Assets component of Net Assets includes \$135 million invested in fiscal 2018 in buildings, equipment and facilities funded by government grants, contributions, operating reserves and internal financing.
- The Unrestricted Deficit consists almost entirely of the University's unfunded liability for employee future benefits, which includes obligations for both pension and non-pension benefits. In fiscal 2018, this deficit increased as the result of an actual return of 3.7% on invested pension plan assets that was lower than the expected return (discount rate) of 5.65%.

ALUMNI AFFAIRS AND DEVELOPMENT



U of G alumni are engaged and give generously of their time and resources to support the University and its shared purpose to Improve Life.

The University of Guelph has 173,000 alumni from more than 160 countries worldwide. That international reach mirrors the University's global presence in teaching, research and international development projects around the globe under the Global@Guelph initiative.

Recent and ongoing projects supported by alumni include:

- Alumni Stadium Pavilion and landscaping project.
- Macdonald Hall renovations.
- Studies of sustainable food engineering and Lyme disease.
- Natural Health Products Research Alliance.
- Student scholarships/travel grants and new faculty positions.

Highlights

 2017/2018 fundraising results were on par with the prior fiscal year and included the largest number of new gifts or pledges of \$1 million or higher confirmed in any fiscal year.

- 124 new planned gifts to support the University of Guelph were confirmed in 2017-18. These new confirmations bring the projected value of confirmed planned gift expectancies to more than \$75 million.
- Donors supported capital projects across campus, with the largest value of gifts directed to the Alumni Stadium Pavilion and Landscaping Project and the Macdonald Hall Renovations. New gifts and pledges to support research included the establishment of research funds of more than \$1 million each in the areas of sustainable food engineering and Lyme disease, and significant sponsorship support for the Natural Health Products Research Alliance. Donors supported 83 new student support initiatives such as scholarships or travel grants and established two new faculty positions.
- 12,617 donors made gifts under \$25,000, totaling \$4,524,7367.
- 99 donors made gifts between \$25,000 and \$499,999, totaling \$8,768,468.





Giving by Purpose (\$), 2017/2018







MCLAUGHLIN LIBRARY



The McLaughlin Library is a central hub on campus that is vital to teaching and learning, as well as research and scholarly pursuits at U of G.

A recent major renovation – the largestever such project in the library – has yielded new spaces and resources, including the following:

- A new Archival and Special Collections space.
- Development of the Scholars Studio for digital scholarship.
- Creation of a media studio for student and faculty support.
- Replacement of study carrels and increased student seating.

Collaborative Futures—a transformational Library Management System—is coming to U of G that will better enable the integration and curation of electronic and print materials.

- McLaughlin Library is one of 14 Ontario universities that are part of the consortium.
- Collectively, the universities have collections that represent more than 18 million records that will be searchable by all consortium partners.
- Collaborative Futures is set to go live in 2020.

Highlights

- The 2017/2018 year saw the completion of the largest renovations in McLaughlin Library's history. The major renovations included:
 - New Archival and Special Collections space—including an exhibit space, a reading room, and a seminar room.
 - Development of the Scholars Studio—a space dedicated to Digital Scholarship.
 - Creation of a Media Studio—for student and faculty support.
 - Increased compact shelving on the lower level.
 - Replacement of study carrels on the lower level and second floor.
- During the renovations, new study carrels replaced nearly 50-year-old ones on the lower level and second floor—come fall 2018, the rest of the old carrels will be replaced.
- The library has increased student seating by five per cent to 3,242— aiming for 3,800 by 2020.
- By fall 2018, the library's entire Scottish Studies Collection will be located on the second floor near the Archival and Special Collections space.

- Access to the library's collection via the website increased to almost 3 million views and continues to grow at a rate of 6 per cent each year.
- Use of electronic resources grew by 11 per cent to more than 3.6 million journal article downloads.
- The learning videos on the library's YouTube Channel had more than 90,000 views and a total watch time of almost 120,000 minutes, (2,000 hours), representing a nearly 100-per-cent increase versus 2016/2017 views.
- The library's collection of course- and topicspecific online guides received more than 195,000 total views.

CAUBO – Canadian Association of University Business Officers

CIHR - Canadian Institutes of Health Research

COFO – Council of Ontario Finance Officers

Credits – Guelph courses are based on credit weight. Most courses are valued at 0.5, and some have credit weighting of 0.25, 0.75 or 1.00. A full-time course load for students at Guelph is 2.00 (typically four courses) or 2.50 (typically five courses) per semester. 2.75 credits is the maximum course load a University of Guelph student can take per semester. Credit weight is based on the amount of work involved in the course, not the number of hours.

CSRDE – Consortium for Student Retention Data Exchange

Degrees Awarded – Refers to total degrees conferred at annual convocations.

FCI – Facility Condition Index

FFTE (Fiscal Full-time Equivalent) – For most undergraduate programs, FFTE is based on the student credit load as a proportion of the normal annual credit load for that program. The normal load is determined by the total required credits specified in the University calendar. For the DVM program, a full-time student generates 0.5 FFTEs in each active term.

Full-time Student – The normal full-time semester load for academic programs is 2.50 credits except where otherwise prescribed by the schedule of studies.

Headcount – Number of students enrolled at the University

International – Students studying at the University on a study permit

MTCU – Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities (formerly MAESD – Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development)

NASM – Net Assignable Square Metres

OMAFRA – Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs

Other Canadian SS – Other Canadian Secondary Schools

OSAP – Ontario Student Assistance Program

OUA – Ontario University Athletics

OUAC - Ontario Universities' Application Centre

Part-time Student – A student who is registered in fewer than 2.00 credits in a semester is considered to be part-time.
